REFERENCE SCRIPTURE(S)

Romans 15:4, Psalms 102:18, Matthew 13:40

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

In this chapter to the Corinthians, Paul challenges them to reflect on the rearview mirror of Israel's history. The purpose is to use Jewish history as a means to convey an important message to the Gentile church. In the first thirteen verses, the author draws upon Israel's wilderness wandering as a cautionary example for the church. The intention is to learn from the mistakes of their ancestors and strive for a positive outcome. The author compares the church to the Israelites who, after their Exodus from Egypt, found themselves wandering in the wilderness. This serves as a reminder that even those who called upon God in times of captivity can stray from Him when seeking freedom.

2. What is meant by the phrase, "the freedom of choice is accompanied by the constraint of consequences"?
